How Can We Not Help?

Feed the Hunger partners with Pastor Moses to feed 54 Hmong orphans who were rescued from the jungle. The orphanage is located 65 miles, or a three-hour drive, from Saigon.

We cannot ship our meal packets to Vietnam for two reasons. First, customs is extremely corrupt; Moses believes it would take bribe money to get the food released.

Second, it would draw unwanted attention to the underground church.

As a result, it is best that we send funds monthly to purchase food for these dear orphans. Thankfully, through supporters like you, God has provided the needed funding into next year.

Moses the Eagle

When you meet a person of great faith, the effect can be two-fold. You are blessed to hear the testimonies of one who relies on God so closely, but you can also be convicted that your own faith hasn't been challenged so deeply while remaining vibrant. Pastor "Moses" is one of those people.

His Vietnamese name translated into English means "eagle". This aptly describes the passion, zeal, and faithfulness that soars before your eyes as you listen to him share his life story and all that God has done in and through him.

His young life was changed dramatically during the Vietnam War. A bomb fell on his house, killing his grandfather, mother, and three siblings. Only he and his father survived. As a boy, Moses came to be saved through the loving witness of Christian missionaries.

Moses has been imprisoned more than once for his faith. He survived the murder, starvation, and disease that daily threatened his life behind bars. With the help of the US government and Voice of the Martyrs, Moses was released after two years and seven months.

Today, Pastor Moses lives in a simple, 4 x 7½-meter single-story home (a mere 323 square feet!) with six other family members. He is one of the leaders of the underground church in Vietnam and remains under constant surveillance. One of his main prayer requests before returning to his home country was that he would make it through airport immigration undeterred.

He credits the effectiveness of the underground church to the three days each month that they dedicate to fasting and prayer. We Americans would do well to follow their lead.

to us recently. This includes projects like freshwater wells, some of which FtH has funded. As villagers come to get physical water, a Bible verse engraved at each well shares about the Living Water.

As we allow God to take the lead in this partnership, we continue to be amazed at Moses' ministry. The underground church has dispatched 55 evangelists by moped across Vietnam. In the last three and a half years, 16,000 have come to the Lord!
